

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

We are now in the middle of summer and with that Council only meets the 4th Monday of the months of July and August. Here are some highlights from their July 24th meeting:

- ⇒ Dawson Road Maintenance Operation Manager, Chris Rottluff and Division Manager, Elcy Lepage appeared as a delegation before Council to provide their Summer Program Update.
- ⇒ Council endorsed the renewal of the Agreement to Occupy between the Village and the Ashcroft & District Curling Club for a two year term ending August 1, 2025
- ⇒ Bylaw Enforcement Officer (BEO), Reggie Amyotte, appeared before Council providing an update. Reggie's goal is to achieve compliance in the least invasive and costeffective way possible. He prefers to use an approachable stance engaging with residents and working with them.
- ⇒ 2023 Light Up Blue this September for Prostate Cancer Awareness! Council unanimously passed the motion to light up Heritage Park and Fire Hall 1 with blue lights.
- ⇒ Council unanimously approved the Ashcroft Farmers and Artisans Co-op Farmers' Market request to close Railway Avenue between 6th and 8th Streets on Sundays from 7:30 am to 1:00 pm Market Sundays until October 22, 2023.
- ⇒ Martina Dopf, Group Publisher of Black Press Media requested the Village's support to stop advertising on the Meta Platforms Facebook and Instagram. Council approved sending a letter of support and advising that we do not advertise on the Meta Platforms.
- \Rightarrow Council proclaimed National Rail Safety Week September 18 to 24, 2023.
- ⇒ Council approved writing a letter of support for the EarthRock Ventures Inc (ERV). ERV is a BC incorporated company, focused on developing and implementing GHG emission reduction and carbon dioxide removal projects using engineered fertilizer solutions and soil amendments for agricultural lands.

WATER CONSUMPTION—BE WATER SMART!!

In the upcoming weeks, the weather prediction is that the Southern Interior as well as other parts of BC will be heading into drought-like conditions. Some BC municipalities have already put their highest stage watering restrictions in place whereby residents are only permitted to water very minimally and some only certain times one day per week.

We ask that our residents be **Water Smart**. Be mindful of your water consumption. And please adhere to our current Stage 1 Water Restrictions. Non-compliance WILL result in fines being administered.

Here are some tips for water conservation that are most helpful in achieving lower water consumption in our Village:

Garden

- Water early in the morning to limit evaporation
- Install a water timer and hose nozzle to control water use
- Opt for drought-tolerant plants and lawn mixtures
- Use mulch to retain soil moisture

Home

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- Replace faucet aerators & shower heads with low-flow options
- Use a toilet tank bank and opt for low-flow, energy savings appliances
- Fill your sink with soapy water to do dishes instead of letting the water run
- Keep a jug of water in the fridge instead of letting the tap run until cold—a running tap uses about one gallon of water per minute

2023 PROPERTY TAXES & DELINQUENT TAXES

The property tax deadline has come and gone. Just a friendly reminder that if you did not make the July 17th deadline, you can still pay your taxes, however, there is a 10% penalty that has been applied to your 2023 remaining balance. If you have not yet claimed your 2023 Home Owner Grant (HOG) you have until December 31st to do so online, telephone or through the local Service BC office. (Instructions are on your property tax notice.) Please remember the 10% penalty has been applied (yes even on outstanding HOGs) and you will be responsible to pay that.

If this is the year you have 3 years worth of property taxes outstanding (2021, 2022 & 2023) then this makes your property tax account delinquent. You are required to at least pay the Delinquent portion of your taxes plus accrued interest prior to 10 am on Monday, September 25th to avoid your property being sold at Tax Sale.

Payments can be made in our office via Debit, Cheque, Cash or through your online or telephone banking.

FIRE SMART

Ashcroft is in the middle of a very dry season. It is time for us to be proactive in our attempt to offset possible fires in our community. BEO, Reggie Amyotte has been diligently monitoring and writing letters to homeowners that have dead trees and/or brush on their properties, especially near their homes. All homeowners are asked to please do your due diligence and look around your homes to see if there are potential fire hazards, no matter what they are, and remove them.

Many forms of cedar hedges and/or cedar trees are not very conducive to our dry-belt climate. They can be a contributing factor and extreme fire hazard as witnessed in the recently unfortunate loss of two homes in North Ashcroft.

Ashcroft Fire Rescue (AFR), together with the Village ask that when considering landscaping or re-landscaping your property, please avoid any types of cedar shrubs, trees, etc. that could potentially increase the risk of fire and loss of property.

A huge shout out to the residents that have begun or completed the process of removing any and all cedars from their properties. AFR and the Village commend you for being proactively FireSmart!
