1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Roden called the meeting to order at 6:00pm.

2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1. Andy Anderson, Ashcroft Home Building Centre – Let’s Paint the Town Promotion

Mr. Anderson advised Council that Home Hardware was partnering with BeautiTone paint on a “Let’s Paint the Town” event. The promotion provides a discount on the cost of primer and paint for commercial buildings. The promotion will run from April 1 – June 30 and there are 200 gallons of paint designated for this event. Mr. Anderson advised that as owners of Home Hardware they are pleased to be able to give back to the community and will promote the Village’s Façade Improvement Program at the same time. Council thanked Mr. Anderson for the information and for the valuable contribution to the community.

2.2. Fire Chief Josh White, Ashcroft Volunteer Fire Department – Annual Update on Operations

Chief White congratulated Council on their election and advised that due to his work schedule he is unable to attend a council meeting during the winter. He provided an overview of the activities of the department for the past year; they responded to 56 calls which was the same number as 2017. A statistical breakdown of the calls revealed that most calls are received on Wednesdays around 5:00 pm. He thanked Council for approving the development of a training centre on the public works property. Chief White then provided council with an overview of interface fires and highlighted areas of concern within the village. He summarized with a thank you to the members of the department and their families for their dedication to the safety of the residents. Council asked a number of questions regarding the Fire Smart program and thanked Chief White and his members for their service.

2.3. Off Leash Dog Park Group – PowerPoint Presentation

Mr. Monty Downs made a presentation to Council on behalf of the local dog owners. He advised that the group believes that the section of land at the southern end of Railway Avenue can be developed into a suitable dog park and that it will take some time to raise funds and develop a plan. Mr. Downs requested that council prepare a Memorandum of Understanding between the “Dog Owners Group” and the Village of Ashcroft that would outline fundraising, planning, development, maintenance, signage, etc. for a minimum of 10 years. The purpose of the MOU is to allow both parties to work together within their clearly defined roles. Council thanked Mr. Downs and the other dog owners for their approach to this project and advised that they would have staff review the proposal and bring it back to a future meeting in May.

Dear Mayor Roden:

At CN, we are committed to environmental safety and sustainability. We are reaching out in order to advise you, that we will be undertaking vegetation control activities for safety purposes, in your area between June 3, 2019 and June 30, 2019. This information will also be made available on the CN website (www.cn.ca/vegetation) shortly.

If not managed properly, trees, brush or other vegetation can severely compromise public safety, including by impeding the view motorists have of incoming trains, increasing the risk of crossing accidents. Moreover, unwanted vegetation can damage the integrity of the railway, increasing the risk of incidents, interfere with signals and switches, contribute to track side fires, compromise employee safety, reduce visibility for train crews at road crossings, of signals and other track side warning devices, to name only a few risks. Our annual vegetation control program is designed to mitigate these risks by eliminating brush, weeds and other undesirable vegetation.

For 2019, CN has retained Asplundh Services to conduct vegetation control along its Canadian rail network.

Should your Town/City have any noxious weed removal requests, we ask that you contact CN's Public Inquiry Line at contact@cn.ca before June 26, 2019 with the specific information and location. CN will make every effort to include those locations as part of our 2019 Vegetation Management Program. All notices sent after the above mentioned date will be included in the 2020 Vegetation Control Management Plan.

We look forward to collaborating with you and answering any questions you may have regarding our vegetation control activities in your community. In that respect, please find attached the Notices CN is publishing in local papers in order to advise the public. We would kindly ask that you post copies on your Community's website and at City Hall or other central locations for a wider distribution.

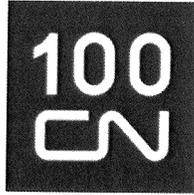

COMMUNITY NOTICE
Annual Vegetation Management Program

CN is required to clear its rights-of-way from any vegetation that may pose a safety hazard. Vegetation on railway rights-of-way, if left uncontrolled, can contribute to trackside fires and impair proper inspection of track infrastructure.

As such, for safe railway operations, the annual vegetation control program will be carried out on CN rail lines in the province of British Columbia. A certified applicator will be applying herbicides on and around the railway tracks (mainly the graveled area/ballast). All product requirements for setbacks in the vicinity of dwellings, aquatic environments and municipal water supplies will be met.

At this time, we expect that the program will take place from June 3, 2019 to June 30, 2019.

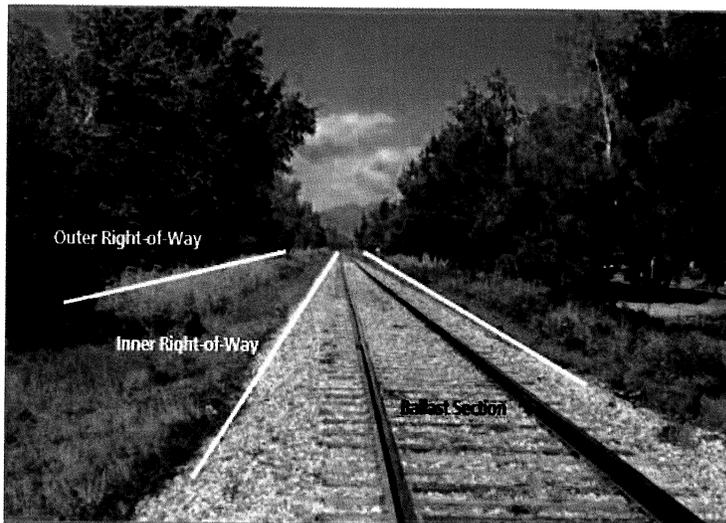

Why does CN need to remove vegetation along its train tracks annually?

Safety at CN is one of our most important core values, and part of maintaining and operating a safe railway is ensuring vegetation is managed along our corridor. CN also has an obligation, pursuant to the *Rules Respecting Track Safety*, adopted under the *Railway Safety Act*, to ensure that vegetation on or immediately adjacent to the railway roadbed is controlled. More specifically, the Rules require federal railways to ensure the track is free of vegetation that could create fire hazards, affect the track integrity or obstruct visibility of operations and inspections. Separate regulations also require removal of vegetation to ensure every grade crossing meets sightline requirements.

Where does CN remove vegetation?

Please note that for the management of vegetation, CN divides its corridor into two components: the ballast and the right of way. The ballast section (graveled area) covers a 16ft width (4.9m). The right of way section covers a 42ft width (13m) on each side of the ballast (graveled area).



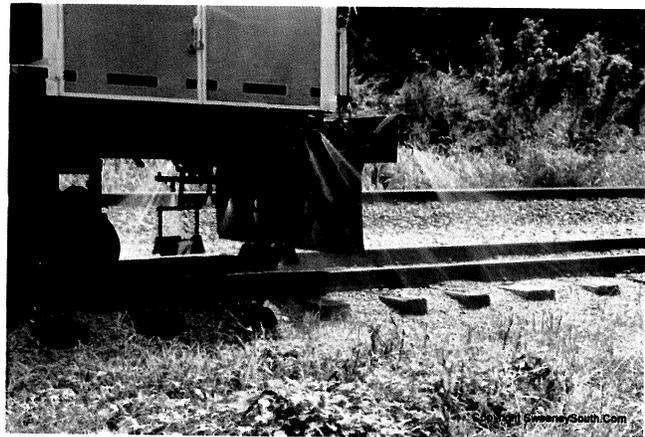
Vegetation in the right of way section needs to be controlled to protect sight lines for train crews to see signal systems and at road crossings, prevent trees from fouling the track during storms, reduce fuel loading to prevent fires, minimize wildlife mortality, ensure

good drainage along ditches and culverts, amongst other safety requirements and is primarily controlled mechanically, through mowing and cutting of vegetation. Certain herbicide products are used (excluding glyphosate) to encourage grasses and small plants rather than shrubs and trees.

The ballast section, on the other hand, is the most critical area as it supports the track infrastructure which supports the movement of freight and passengers; this section also provides an area for train crew to safely inspect their train. Given the crucial role it plays in ensuring the safety and integrity of rail operations, this section must be devoid of all vegetation. The only proven way to effectively remove vegetation in the ballast section is through chemical application.



How will you manage dry plants and herbs left once the spraying is complete?

Ensuring vegetation is controlled on an annual basis is the best method to reduce larger volumes of dead and dry plants. This is because it kills plants when they are smaller which reduces the amount and volume of dead plant material. CN's 2019 program has been developed specifically with this in mind. Most plants, once dead, will naturally decay leaving little debris. As for the right of way, the herbicides used are selective and the grass cover will remain intact while any broadleaved species or noxious weeds will be controlled.

Will you be using Glyphosate. If so, is it dangerous for us or my pets ?

All pesticides used in Canada must be registered by Health Canada's Pest Management Regulatory Agency (PMRA) and CN only uses pesticides that have been approved for use in Canada and in the Province within which they are applied. Protection of human health and the environment is Health Canada's primary

objective in the regulation of pesticides and all pesticides must undergo rigorous science-based assessments before being approved for sale in Canada. The PMRA also re-evaluates registered pesticides on a cyclical basis to ensure they continue to meet modern health and environmental standards. In this regard, the PMRA re-evaluated glyphosate in 2017 and reaffirmed its conclusions that products containing glyphosate do not present risks of concern to human health or the environment when used in accordance with revised label directions. CN's vegetation control contractor uses glyphosate in accordance with label directions.

Has CN tried any non-chemical weed control options in the past, such as weed whacking? Have they worked?

CN has used weed cutting in the past to control vegetation, but this does not remove the roots, and actually encourages more growth, therefore it is not an effective long-term solution for vegetation removal along railway tracks. The application of steam injection has also been investigated; however they have proven ineffective in killing the roots, which could compromise the integrity of the rail bed.

CN has also explored other options, such as high concentrate vinegar (acetic acid), however this was deemed not a viable option as the acid reacts negatively with steel and the sensitive electronic monitoring equipment used to regulate safe movement and operation of trains.

I am an organic farmer adjacent to your tracks, should I be worried?

Most of the vegetation control focuses on the ballast section (graveled area) which is 16ft (4.9 meters) wide, leaving about 13 meters of right of way on each side of the ballast. The equipment used for application is a shrouded boom which focuses the spray downward to reduce potential drift. Application must also be done during appropriate weather conditions, including low wind levels.

Can I request my area not be sprayed?

Safety is of utmost importance to CN and vegetation control is a key component of keeping our employees and the communities in which we operate safe. Ensuring vegetation is kept clear of our infrastructure, signals, road crossing sight lines and enabling our teams to inspect and maintain the track is critically important. As a result, we cannot choose to have a reduced safety management process in some areas and so all areas of the CN ballast section must be treated to control vegetation.

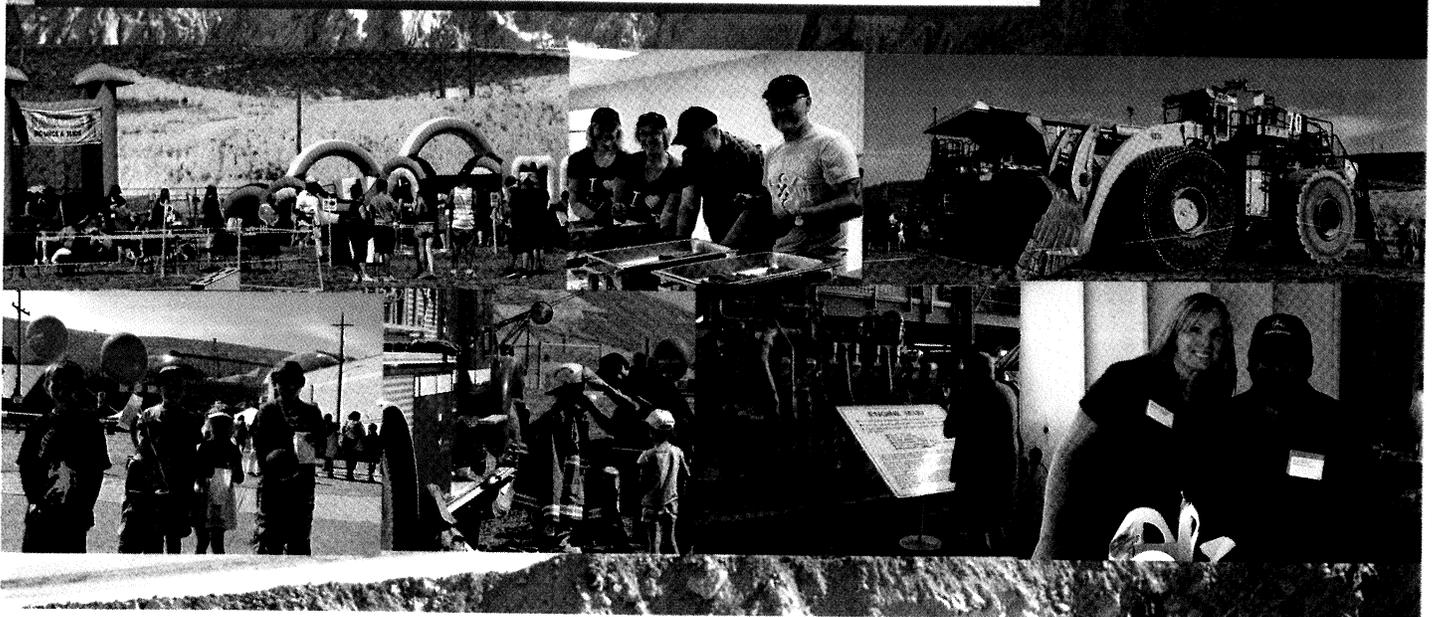

SUBJECT: COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS – REQUESTED CHANGES

Background

At the Inaugural meeting of Council, or shortly thereafter, the Mayor appoints members of Council to various boards and committees. These appointments may be reviewed and amended throughout the term of Council by Council resolution.

Discussion

Councillor Anderson and Councillor Anstett have advised Mayor Roden that their availability to attend meetings has changed since the committees were appointed and they are requesting modifications. They are requesting that Councillor Anderson become the Village's representative on the Northern Development Initiative Trust Regional Advisory Committee and Councillor Anstett be the alternate. Councillor Anstett has also requested that he be appointed as the Seniors' Liaison. These requests will be addressed later in this report.

Staff suggests that the entire Section 8 – Reports of the current agenda format should be reorganized for clarity. Staff advises that the list of Council reports should be divided into three categories: Mandatory Committees (Finance Committee), Appointment/Liaison to External Boards & Organizations and Council/Community Committees.

The Mandatory Committee is the Finance Committee. Current legislation requires local governments to have a Finance/Audit Committee that meets regularly to review the financial position of the organization. The Chief Financial Officer has developed the Terms of Reference for this committee already.

The second subheading for Section 8 – Reports would be Council/Community Committee Reports and would include the following:

- Tourism
- Economic Development
- Heritage

Staff suggests that these committees are an opportunity to engage residents/businesses and work together on projects for the betterment of the community as a whole. Staff suggests that the Tourism and Economic Development Committees be combined as they share the same goals and objectives. Terms of Reference/Mandates for each of these could be developed that would provide the guidelines to developing a long term plan. This eliminates the impression that the Council member appointed to the committee is solely responsible for the activities.

The third subheading for Section 8 – Reports would be Appointment/Liaison to External Boards and Organizations. The members of Council appointed under this heading would be responsible for attending meetings and be a conduit for sharing information between council and the organization. Under this heading the following items would be included:

Background

The Village of Ashcroft and the Village of Clinton operate a local transit service in partnership with BC Transit and Yellowhead Community Services (YCS). The Village of Ashcroft is the signatory on the partnership agreement with BC Transit. We have a second funding agreement with the Village of Clinton.

Discussion

In 2017 the five year operating agreement was replaced with a Transit Service Agreement (TSA) which is an accompanying document to the Annual Operating Agreement (AOA). The TSA outlines the responsibilities of all parties, provides a definition of service and defines the service area and service standards.

The AOA contains similar information but also establishes the fees to use the system, service specification (ie: days and hours of service) and a budget summary. The term of the AOA is from April 1, 2019 to March 31, 2020. A copy is attached for your reference.

The Village is pleased with the operation of the transit system and believe that it is operating efficiently and cost effectively. The projected budget can be accommodated within the annual budgets established by the Village of Clinton and ourselves. As Council is aware, the lease fees have had an impact on our budgets but we are confident that we have sufficient reserves to cover any unforeseen expenses.

Recommendation

Administration is seeking the following resolution:

"THAT the Chief Administrative Officer be authorization to sign the Annual Operating Agreement with BC Transit for the period April 1, 2019 to March 31, 2020."

SUBJECT: 2019-20 Annual Operating Agreement

Further to the information provided in your budget forecast and subsequent budget discussions, please find enclosed your final 2019-2020 Annual Operating Agreement (AOA) for approval.

The transit industry continues to evolve, and the transportation landscape has changed significantly since 2009 when BC Transit completed its first strategic plan. With emerging technologies, evolving customer expectations, and significant funding opportunities, the next decade will likely alter the industry for years to come. In response to this, BC Transit is in the process of updating our Strategic Plan, which will guide our priorities and decision-making over the next five to ten years.

As your participation is integral to our strategic plan, we encourage you to join us at this year's BC Transit Workshop where we will be discussing and envisioning the future in support of this effort. This year's Workshop will be held from June 3-6, 2019 at the Coast Kamloops Hotel and Conference Centre. Our Workshop provides an opportunity to collectively influence transit on a provincial scale and participate in dialogue with partners from various roles and backgrounds within the provision of public transit. Some of this year's topics will include Going Green: BC Transit Low Carbon Fleet Strategy, The Future of Fares and Technology and our annual Local Government Roundtable session. I hope to see you there!

BC Transit continues to capitalize on the significant investment in transit infrastructure made possible by the Government of Canada and the Province of British Columbia through the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP). This funding is currently supporting the construction of new infrastructure projects around the province, and the on-going implementation of our SmartBus program. This program includes technologies that enable real time information to passengers via the NextRide platform and advanced fare payment options.

INFORMATION CONTAINED IN THIS AGREEMENT IS SUBJECT TO THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION AND PROTECTION OF PRIVACY ACT. CONSULT WITH THE AUTHORITY PRIOR TO RELEASING INFORMATION TO INDIVIDUALS OR COMPANIES OTHER THAN THOSE WHO ARE PARTY TO THIS AGREEMENT.

ANNUAL OPERATING AGREEMENT

BETWEEN:

VILLAGE OF ASHCROFT

(the "Municipality")

AND:

BRITISH COLUMBIA TRANSIT

(the "Authority")

WHEREAS the Authority is authorized to contract for transit services for the purpose of providing and maintaining those services and facilities necessary for the establishment, maintenance and operation of a public passenger transportation system in the Transit Service Area;

WHEREAS the Municipality is authorized to enter into one or more agreements with the Authority for transit services in the Transit Service Area;

WHEREAS the parties hereto have entered into a Transit Service Agreement which sets out the general rights and responsibilities of the parties hereto;

WHEREAS the Municipality and the Authority are authorized to share in the costs for the provision of a Public Passenger Transportation System pursuant to the *British Columbia Transit Act*;

AND WHEREAS the parties hereto wish to enter into an Annual Operating Agreement which sets out, together with the Transit Service Agreement, the specific terms and conditions for the Public Passenger Transportation System for the upcoming term.

NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises and of the covenants hereinafter contained, the parties covenant and agree with each other as follows:

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SECTION 1: DEFINITIONS

Unless agreed otherwise in the Annual Operating Agreement, the definitions set out in the Transit Service Agreement shall apply to this Annual Operating Agreement including:

- a) "Annual Operating Agreement" shall mean this Annual Operating Agreement and any Annual Operating Agreement Amendments negotiated and entered into by the parties subsequent hereto;
- b) "Transit Service Agreement" shall mean the Transit Service Agreement between the parties to this Annual Operating Agreement, including any amendments made thereto;

SECTION 2: INCORPORATION OF SCHEDULES

All schedules to this agreement are incorporated into the agreement, and form part of the agreement.

SECTION 3: INCORPORATION OF TRANSIT SERVICE AGREEMENT

Upon execution, this Annual Operating Agreement shall be deemed integrated into the Transit Service Agreement and thereafter the Transit Service Agreement and Annual Operating Agreement shall be read together as a single integrated document and shall be deemed to be the Annual Operating Agreement for the purposes of the *British Columbia Transit Act*, as amended from time to time.

SECTION 4: TERM AND RENEWAL

- a) The parties agree that the effective date of this agreement is to be April 1, 2019, whether or not the agreements have been fully executed by the necessary parties. Once this agreement and the associated Transit Service Agreement are duly executed, this agreement will replace all provisions in the existing Transit Service Agreement and Master Operating Agreement with respect to the rights and obligations as between the Authority and the Municipality.
- b) Upon commencement in accordance with Section 4(a) of this agreement, the term of this agreement shall be to March 31, 2020 except as otherwise provided herein. It is acknowledged by the parties that in the event of termination or non-renewal of the Annual Operating Agreement, the Transit Service Agreement shall likewise be so terminated or not renewed, as the case may be.
- c) Either party may terminate this agreement as follows:
 - a. Cancellation by the Authority: In the event that the Authority decides to terminate this Agreement for any reason whatsoever, the Authority shall provide at least one hundred and eighty (180) days prior written notice. Such notice to be provided in accordance with Section 10.
 - b. Cancellation by the Municipality: In the event that the Municipality decides to terminate this Transit Service Agreement for any reason whatsoever, and by extension the Annual Operating Agreement, the Municipality shall provide at least one hundred and eighty (180) days prior written notice. Such notice to be provided in accordance with Section 10.

SECTION 5: FREEDOM OF INFORMATION AND PROTECTION OF PRIVACY ACT

This Agreement and the parties hereto are subject to the provisions of the *Freedom Of Information And Protection Of Privacy Act* ("FOIPPA"). Any information developed in the performance of this Agreement, or any personal information obtained, collected, stored pursuant to this Agreement, including database information, shall be deemed confidential and subject to

the provisions of the FOIPPA including the handling, storage, access and security of such information. Confidential information shall not be disclosed to any third party except as expressly permitted by the Authority or pursuant to the requirements of the FOIPPA.

SECTION 6: SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

In the event of any dispute arising between or among the parties as to their respective rights and obligations under this Agreement, or in the event of a breach of this Agreement, the parties agree to use their best efforts to find resolution through a mediated settlement. However, in the event that mediation is not successful in finding a resolution satisfactory to all parties involved, any party shall be entitled to give to the other notice of such dispute and to request arbitration thereof; and the parties may, with respect to the particular matter then in dispute, agree to submit the same to a single arbitrator in accordance with the applicable statutes of the Province of British Columbia.

SECTION 7: MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- a) Amendment: This agreement may only be amended in writing signed by the Municipality and the Authority and specifying the effective date of the amendment.
- b) Assignment: This Agreement shall not be assignable without prior written consent of the parties.
- c) Enurement: This Agreement shall be binding upon and enure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective successors.
- d) Operating Reserve Fund: In accordance with OIC 594, in fiscal year 2015/16, BC Transit established a Reserve Fund to record, for each local government, the contributions that BC Transit has received but has not yet earned.
 - a. BC Transit will invoice and collect on monthly Municipal invoices based on budgeted Eligible Expenses.
 - b. Any expenditure of monies from the Reserve Fund will only be credited towards Eligible Expenses for the location for which it was collected.
 - c. Eligible Expenses are comprised of the following costs of providing Public Passenger Transportation Systems:
 - i. *For Conventional Transit Service:*
 1. the operating costs incurred in providing Conventional Transit Service excluding interest and amortization;
 2. the amount of any operating lease costs incurred by BC Transit for Conventional Transit Services;
 3. the amount of the municipal administration charge not exceeding 2% of the direct operating costs payable under an Annual Operating Agreement;
 4. an amount of the annual operating costs of BC Transit not exceeding 8% of the direct operating costs payable under an Annual Operating Agreement;
 - ii. *For Custom Transit Service:*
 1. the operating costs incurred in providing Custom Transit Service excluding interest and amortization, but including the amount paid by BC Transit to redeem taxi saver coupons issued under the Taxi Saver Program after deducting from that amount the amount realized from the sale of those coupons;
 2. the amount of any operating lease costs incurred by BC Transit for Custom Transit Service;

3. the amount of the municipal administration charge not exceeding 2% of the direct operating costs payable under an Annual Operating Agreement; and,
 4. an amount of the annual operating costs of BC Transit not exceeding 8% of the direct operating costs payable under an Annual Operating Agreement;
- d. Eligible Expenses exclude the costs of providing third-party 100%-funded services; and,
 - e. BC Transit will provide an annual statement of account of the reserves received and utilized, including any interest earned for each local government.
- e) The parties agree that this agreement is in substantial compliance with all relevant legislative requirements to establish the rights and obligations of the parties as set out in the *British Columbia Transit Act*.
 - f) BC Transit acknowledges receipt of a copy of that certain Community Transit Partnership Agreement between the Municipality and the Thompson Nicola Regional District and Interior Health Authority (the "Partner") effective April 1, 2006. BC Transit hereby provides written consent for the Municipality to enter into the Community Transit Partnership Agreement; provided, however, that:
 - a. In the event the Partner provides one year's notice of its intention to terminate the Community Transit Partnership Agreement, the Municipality will immediately notify the Authority in writing of such termination;
 - b. In the event the Partner provides the Municipality with a payment in lieu of providing notice of termination pursuant to Section 4 of the Community Transit Partnership Agreement, the Municipality will immediately forward to BC Transit the full amount of such payment, without setoff whatsoever; and,
 - c. In the event the Partner provides the Municipality with payment in accordance with the subsection above, and the Municipality fails or neglects to forward such payment to the Authority, the Authority shall have the right to include such amount in its monthly invoice to the Municipality for immediate payment by the Municipality.

SECTION 8: GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement is governed by and shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the Province of British Columbia, with respect to those matters within provincial jurisdiction, and in accordance with the laws of Canada with respect to those matters within the jurisdiction of the government of Canada.

SECTION 9: COUNTERPARTS

This contract and any amendment hereto may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original and all of which shall be considered to be one and the same contract. A signed facsimile or pdf copy of this contract, or any amendment, shall be effective and valid proof of execution and delivery.

SECTION 10: NOTICES AND COMMUNICATIONS

All notices, claims and communications required or permitted to be given hereunder shall be in writing and shall be sufficiently given if personally delivered to a designated officer of the parties hereto to whom it is addressed or if mailed by prepaid registered mail to the Authority at:

Background

The Village of Ashcroft Grants in Aid Policy states that all applications for a Grant in Aid will be brought to a Council meeting for consideration. The policy suggests that these application be considered at a Committee of the Whole meeting, however past Councils have considered them during regular council meetings. A copy of the Grant In Aid Policy is attached for your reference.

Discussion

Attached to this report is an application from South Cariboo Sportsman Association (the "Association") seeking financial assistance to assist with repairs to the road to their clubhouse and trap shooting range. The application falls within the Sports and Recreation Grant in Aid category.

The Association was impacted by the 2017 Elephant Hill wildfire. Their rifle and pistol ranges were destroyed and the hillside was completely burned off. The subsequent rains have resulted in mud and debris flows washing out their access road, contaminating their water source and covering many of their ranges with mud. The repairs to the road will be completed in stages, with the initial stage being the supply and installation of a culvert. The total cost for stage 1 is \$11,200 plus GST. Once the road is stabilized the Association will proceed with additional repairs necessary to bring their clubhouse back to full operation. The Association's site is outside of the Village of Ashcroft boundaries however many of their members are residents of Ashcroft. The club organizes a number of events throughout the year which bring visitors to our area.

Attached to this memo is the completed application form, the financial statement and the project budget. WRAPS has not received a grant in aid for any other project during 2018.

Recommendation

Administration advises that Council has two options regarding this application:

- a. Council can approve the application for a Grant-in-Aid in the amount of \$500 to the South Cariboo Sportsman Association to assist with repairs to the access to their site; or
- b. Council can deny the application for a Grant-in-Aid in the amount of \$500 to the South Cariboo Sportsman Association.

SUBJECT: Northern Development Initiative Trust – Housing Needs Assessment Grant

Background

The Northern Development Initiative Trust (NDIT) provides an opportunity for municipalities to apply for funding under various funding streams. Many of the grants require a Resolution of Council to complete the application. The Council resolution ensures that Council is in favour of the project and will support the initiative throughout its duration.

Discussion

The Province of British Columbia has mandated in the Local Government Act, Division 22, Section 585 that all Municipalities and Regional Districts must complete a Housing Needs Report within 3 years ending 2021.

As the development of a Housing Needs Assessment is mandated by the Province of BC, with the potential developments in north Ashcroft, this is the ideal time to complete the assessment. The completed report should provide detailed information regarding the housing needs and wants of the community and provide direction to staff and developers as these projects move forward.

A quote to complete the Housing Needs Assessment was provided to the Village from Urban Systems Ltd. (attached). Total cost of the project is quoted at \$25,000. Staff has identified two funding sources that will fund the project in its entirety.

NDIT is currently accepting grant applications to complete Housing Needs Assessments to a maximum of \$10,000 leveraged at 50%; meaning NDIT will fund up to half of the project costs. UBCM also offers grant funding for Housing Needs Assessments, Ashcroft qualifies for up to \$15,000. Staff's intent is to use these two funding opportunities and leverage the total cost of the project. With Council's endorsement we will submit simultaneous applications to NDIT and UBCM.

Recommendation

Administration advises that Council has two options regarding this application:

- a. **THAT, Council approve the application to Northern Development Initiative Trust to complete the Housing Needs Assessment in the amount of \$10,000 and further that, Council support the project throughout its duration; or**
- b. **THAT, Council deny the application to Northern Development Initiative Trust to complete the Housing Needs Assessment and reconsider this project at a later date.**

SUBJECT: Union Of British Columbia Municipalities – Housing Needs Assessment Grant

Background

The Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) provides an opportunity for municipalities to apply for funding to develop a Housing Needs Assessment as mandated by the Province. The grant requires a Resolution of Council to complete the application. The Council resolution ensures that Council is in favour of the project and will support the initiative throughout its duration.

Discussion

The Province of British Columbia has mandated in the Local Government Act, Division 22, Section 585 that all Municipalities and Regional Districts must complete a Housing Needs Report within 3 years ending 2021.

As the development of a Housing Needs Assessment is mandated by the Province of BC, with the potential developments in north Ashcroft, this is the ideal time to complete the assessment. The completed report should provide detailed information regarding the housing needs and wants of the community and provide direction to staff and developers as these projects move forward.

A quote to complete the Housing Needs Assessment was provided to the Village from Urban Systems Ltd. (attached to NDIT Memo). Total cost of the project is quoted at \$25,000. Staff has identified two funding sources that will fund the project in its entirety.

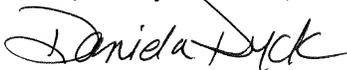
UBCM is currently accepting grant applications to complete Housing Needs Assessments to a maximum of \$15,000. Staff would like to leverage these funds with the NDIT funding application request in the amount of \$10,000 to maximize grant opportunities for the development of a Housing Needs Assessment at no cost to the Village of Ashcroft.

Recommendation

SUBJECT: Grant Application to Natural Resources Canada – Electric Vehicle Charging Station

Background

Natural Resources Canada grant application intake is open for submissions until May 16, 2019 under the Electric Vehicle and Alternative Fuel Infrastructure Deployment Initiative (EVAFIDI) funding stream. This grant opportunity would enable the Village to leverage the cost of the purchase and installation of the Electric Vehicle Fast Charging Station that was proposed at the Water Treatment Plant.

Discussion

In 2018 the Village of Ashcroft submitted a grant application to Natural Resources Canada (NRCan) under the EVAFIDI for purchase and install one Electric Vehicle Fast Charging Station as part of the Water Treatment Plant infrastructure. The application was not approved at that time.

The installation of the Electric Vehicle Fast Charging Station as included in the design of the Water Treatment Plant. During construction the conduit cable was installed in preparation of the future installation of the charging station.

At this time the Village would like to resubmit a revised version of the application with Council's approval. NRCan's funding program will approve grants up to \$50,000. The original projected cost, was approximately \$117,000, the Village of Ashcroft will be responsible for the remainder of the costs. If funding is not approved this project will not move forward as the entire cost of the project is not a consideration in the 2019 budget.

Recommendation

Administration advises that Council has two options regarding this application:

- a. **THAT, Council approve to submit a grant application to Natural Resource Canada under the Electric Vehicle and Alternative Infrastructure Deployment Initiative in the amount of \$50,000 to offset the purchase and installation cost of one Electric Vehicle Fast Charging Station to be installed at the Water Treatment Plant; and further that, Council support the project throughout its duration; or**
- b. **THAT, Council deny the application to Natural Resource Canada's Electric Vehicle and Alternative Infrastructure Deployment Initiative grant program to offset the cost of one Electric Vehicle Fast Charging Station to be installed at the Water Treatment Plant.**

Schedule 'B' of Bylaw No. 827**

In accordance with Section 165(3.1) of the *Community Charter*, the Village of Ashcroft (Town) is required to include in the Five Year Financial Plan, objectives and policies regarding each of the following:

1. The proportion of total revenue that comes from each of the funding sources described in Section 165(7) of the *Community Charter*;
2. The distribution of property taxes among the property classes, and
3. The use of permissive tax exemptions.

Funding Sources

Table 1 shows the proportion of total revenue proposed to be raised from each funding source in 2019. Property taxes form the greatest proportion of revenue. As a revenue source, property taxation offers a number of advantages, for example, it is simple to administer and it is fairly easy for residents to understand. It offers a stable and reliable source of revenue for services that are difficult to fund on a user-pay basis. These include services such as general administration, fire protection, police services, bylaw enforcement and street lighting.

User fees and charges form the second largest portion of planned revenue. Many services can be measured and charged on a user basis. Services where fees and charges can be easily administered include water and sewer usage, building permits, business licenses, and sale of services – these are charged on a user pay basis. User fees attempt to apportion the value of a service to those who use the service.

Objective

- Over the next five years, the Village of Ashcroft will balance the proportion of revenue that is received from user fees and charges with the projected funds operations require.

Policies

- The Village will review all user fee levels to ensure they are adequately meeting both the capital and delivery costs of the service.
- Where possible, the Village will endeavor to supplement revenues from user fees and charges, rather than taxation, to lessen the burden on its limited property tax base.

Distribution of Property Tax Rates

Table 2 outlines the distribution of property taxes among the property classes. The residential property class provides the largest proportion of property tax revenue. This is appropriate as this class also forms the largest portion of the assessment base and consumes the majority of Town services.

Objectives

- Maintain the property tax rate as low as possible while still providing for future needs.

Policies

- Continue to maintain and encourage economic development initiatives designed to attract more retail and commercial businesses to invest in the community. New investment from these areas will help offset tax increases while providing more revenue for the Village.
- Align the distribution of tax rates among the property classes with the social and economic goals of the community, particularly to encourage a range of employment opportunities.
- Regularly review and compare the Village of Ashcroft's tax burden relative to other municipalities in British Columbia.

Permissive Tax Exemptions

- The Annual Municipal Report for 2018 contains a list of permissive exemptions granted for the taxation year and the amount of revenue foregone. The list demonstrates the policy of council that permissive exemptions are granted to not-for-profit institutions that form a valuable part of our community. These include religious institutions and some recreational facilities and service organizations.

Objective

- To ensure permissive tax exemptions are utilized to maximize the benefit to the municipality and citizens.

Policy

- To maintain permissive exemptions for religious institutions, recreational facilities, and service organizations.

Capital Asset Reserve

- In 2011 the Village recognized the need to accumulate funds to pay for future replacement of infrastructure. Accordingly a separate tax was established and funds collected are accounted for separately from general municipal taxes.

Objective

- To establish a reserve to fund future infrastructure replacement.

Policy

- To supplement revenues from government grants wherever possible to lessen the amount of funds utilized from the reserve fund.
- To seek out projects which will reduce the operating costs of the Village enabling them to repay funds back into the reserve over time.

Being a bylaw for the levying of rates for municipal, hospital, and regional district purposes for the year 2019.

The Council of the Corporation of the Village of Ashcroft, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. The following rates are hereby imposed and levied for the year 2019:
 - a. For all lawful general purposes of the municipality on the assessed value of land and improvements taxable for general and municipal purposes, rates appearing in column "A" of the schedule attached hereto and forming a part hereof.
 - b. For capital asset reserve purposes on the assessed value of land and improvements taxable for general municipal purposes, rates appearing in column "B" of the schedule attached hereto and forming a part hereof.
 - c. For hospital purposes on the assessed value of land and improvements taxable for hospital district purposes, rates appearing in column "C" of the schedule attached hereto and forming a part hereof.
 - d. For Thompson-Nicola Regional District purposes on the assessed value of land and improvements for hospital district purposes, rates appearing in column "E" of the schedule attached hereto and forming a part hereof.
2. The minimum amount of taxation upon a parcel of real property shall be one dollar (\$1.00).
3. This bylaw may be cited as "Tax Rates Bylaw No. 828, 2019".
