Q6 Community-Wide Broad Planning Actions Taken in 201	8
1.	Village Official Community Plan and bylaws was revised in 2018. A much greater emphasis is on the environment arising from the feedback from the community.
2.	OCP Targets: Section 8:Further expanding the village commitment and targets. The prior OCP targeted reducing greenhouse gases by 10% based on 2007 CEEI report prepared by the province. The 2012 emissions were 4,511 tonnes/CO2E, which represented a 20% reduction in emissions (excluding transportation since CEEI did not include transportation). The village has set a new target of reducing emissions by a further 10% below the 2012 level by 2025.
3.	Manage and expand use of Community Transit services. Discussions continue to expand transit to the neighbouring community of Cache Creek.
4.	Continued focus on community education for water conservation backed by with updated water conservation bylaw.
5.	Implementing of OCP policies around growing compact and diverse neighbourhoods, and zoning bylaws are under review to allow for carriage homes and secondary suites.
