

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Council met April 14th and 28th. Here are some highlights from those meetings:

- ⇒ Water Regulations Amendment Bylaw No. 874, Sewer Regulations Amendment Bylaw No. 875, and Consolidated Fees and Charges Amendment Bylaw No. 876 were adopted
- ⇒ Council approved the Structure Fire Protection Services Agreement between the Village and TNRD (Electoral Area "I" Rural Ashcroft Fire Protection Service Area) as presented and authorized the Mayor & Corporate Officer to sign
- \Rightarrow CFO Bhalla guided Council and gallery members through a line-by-line budget presentation
- \Rightarrow Council approved a Letter of Support requested by the Equality Project
- \Rightarrow The Five Year Financial Plan Bylaw No. 877, 2025 and the Tax Rates Bylaw No. 878, 2025 were introduced and read three times by Council
- $\Rightarrow\,$ CAO Dyck gave Council her report on the FireSmart BC Wildfire Resiliency and Training Summit she attended
- ⇒ DPW Bennewith updated Council on the 2025 Pool Staffing. Our Pool Supervisor is returning for her 11th Season; we have hired 4 lifeguards and 1 junior lifeguard; 1 lifeguard has advised she has obtained her instructor certifications, so we are working on what we can do to offer some lessons.
- ⇒ Council approved Ashcroft Farmers' Market request for free use of Heritage Park and Railway Ave. road closure for 2025 Season beginning May 11th
- \Rightarrow Council accepted the 2024 Audited Financial Statements as presented by Shawn Birkenhead of Doane, Grant Thornton LLP

WHY WATER CONSERVATION?

Water is one of the most essential resources on Earth, sustaining all forms of life and supporting ecosystems, agriculture, industry, and human health. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT WORKING GROUP UPDATE

The Working Group is recommending that Council consider replacing the aging "Welcome to Ashcroft" signs in the 2026 budget. An inventory of businesses and available properties is also being developed, along with an Investor Page to support economic growth.

Although NDIT tourism funding was not approved, key marketing projects are continuing, including social media posts, updated brochures, and branded videos.

Looking ahead to 2025, the focus will shift to local business support. Plans include a Business Mixer and Business Walk in partnership with Community Futures, with surveys to gauge interest in extended hours, workshops, and participation in the Working Group.

Strategic priorities will be adjusted to reflect available funding.



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ASHCROFT AWARDED \$2.7M GRANT FOR COMMUNITY WATER METER PROJECT

The Village of Ashcroft is pleased to announce it has received \$2.7 million in provincial funding through the Universal Water Metering Pilot Project. This grant will fully cover the purchase and installation of water meters in the community—with no direct cost to residents.

This project is an important step toward upgrading local water and sewer infrastructure and ensuring long-term sustainability. With full funding in place, the Village is moving forward with a smart, cost-effective plan that benefits all residents.

A dedicated project webpage will launch soon, offering updates, FAQs, and ways for residents to stay connected. The Village will also host community events—such as town halls, drop-ins, and online forums—to share information and gather feedback.

Engineering estimates indicate the grant will cover all costs, including a built-in contingency. If additional funds are needed, the Village will use reserves to avoid passing any costs on to residents.

The Village encourages open, respectful dialogue throughout the process. Harassment of staff or Council will not be tolerated—we're committed to working together with kindness and mutual respect.
